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## February is the Metalcrafter auction

The program for February is the metalcrafter auction. We are hoping that, after this year, we can afford to add a hydraulic press to the craft center. **Our auction is silent** --which means that bidders add their bids to the

slip of paper with the item and the item remains on the table until the auction closes at 7:45. At that time, the high bidder may remove the item from the table and pay for it. Items to be auctioned will include **jewelry, tools, gems and findings** and several really **nice slabs of turquoise** that were donated to the club by the Avina family. In addition to these items, the Avina family has also very generously donated a **large amount of silver wire** (bezel and otherwise) and some silver sheet. Most of this material will be **FOR SALE** (you do not have to bid, just take what you want and pay the price listed). For Sale items and Auction items will be separated to minimize confusion.

You will also notice two different colors of bid/sales slips. The green slips are for the Avina family items. The income from these items will be split between the gemcrafters and the metalcrafters so it is important that Pete gets your slips when you pay. More Avina family donations will be available at the gemcrafter auction in April.

Anyone who wants to **bid anonymously** may get a bid number from Pete at the beginning of the auction.

## 2005 Club Statistics

- At the end of 2005, the club's membership was **73 individuals** and **38 families**, an increase over 2004.
- **Monthly meeting attendance averaged 38 members** for a yearly total of 20.75 hours.
- **Open house attendance averaged 118** (club members excluded) with larger attendance seen for the Spring event.
- **The Gemcrafters and Metalcrafters held 80 meetings** for a total of 199 hours. **Beaders held 9 meetings** for a total of 13 hours. **Faceteers** met 12 times, with an average of 4members/meeting. Gemcrafters averaged 8 members/meeting, Metalcrafters averaged 6 and Beaders averaged 2.
- **Nine club members contributed 162.5 hours to finish the construction of the Garage**

## TBG Volunteer Hours for 2005

We had our building open every first Sunday from 1:30-3:30 as requested by TBG for a total of **56 volunteer hours**. Our open houses in May and November

required 326.5 demonstrator hours which, according to previous written communications with TBG, are credited at half time, therefore garnering us **163.25 volunteer hours**. Those who helped with the TBG plant sale and Crosby Festival, earned another **69 volunteer hours**. The Toledo Gem and Rockhound Club was represented at all ROC and Heralding meetings and participated in Arts in the Gardens and Heralding the Holidays. Committee work for these events (a TG&RC club member chaired the *Heralding* committee, TG&RC volunteers coordinated publicity and printings for both events and TG&RC volunteers helped with parking and bussing tables at *Heralding*) add another **50 volunteer hours** for the club. Finally, demonstrators at Arts in the Gardens contributed 37.5 hours, which, according to the aforementioned agreement, are credited as half-time, accounting for **18.75 volunteer hours**. Finally, The club finished construction of the new garage - an addition of **162.5 volunteer hours** for a total of **519.5 volunteer hours**.

**TBG** was happy with the turn out for **Heralding the Holidays**.

**Gemcrafters** will be ordering new blades and wheels. Saws will be cleaned up the first of February, and after the cleaning, no dirty, iron-based rocks will be allowed for cutting, unless the cutter cleans the saw.

Larry shared his recently made cabochons of Ohio Flint and Phoenix Jasper stone. He praised Chet and the gemcrafters for teaching members and himself how to make cabochons.

**Attendance:** 26 members 2 juniors.

**Metal crafter** meetings will be as posted in the Rocky Reader. Upcoming classes, taught by Deb Hoffmaster, will be held on Jan 21 for instruction on Argentium silver, and Jan 26, for making a box clasp. Fees will be \$40 for the argentium class and \$20 for the box clasp class.

Deb Hoffmaster received the **President's award for Outstanding Service** to the club.

New officers were installed. Joe Motter and Marshall Waters were not in attendance.

**Sunshine:** Dan Ruskin, who used to be a member, recently passed away. He was affectionately known as Dan the Plating Man, since he was interested in plating.

Next **faceteer** meeting will be at Don Ault's house.

Larry thanked the membership for support of his Presidency.

## Minutes of the Board Meeting

January 10, 2006

The meeting was called to order by President Jim Leslie at 7:05 p.m.

Present: Larry Barrick, Linn Petersen, Kathy Petersen, Jim Leslie, Mike Mayers, Gayle O'Riordon, Marshall Waters

Absent: Joe Motter, Mike Burcewicz, Harold Burleson

Those present reviewed the TBG Annual Report, submitted by Deb Hoffmaster, and unanimously approved it.

Gayle O'Riordon will audit the Treasurer's books for 2005. Proposed 2006 budget was discussed. There was discussion about returning the Rocky Reader publication to every month, and costs of the mailing were discussed. Although many are emailed, there are still about 70 mailed. Ways to make additional money through ads was discussed. Ed Reynolds is currently the only ongoing advertiser. Larry is willing to call potential advertisers. A request for ads could be put in the Rocky Reader. The 2006 budget was approved by the board by unanimous vote.

Gayle presented the show budget, which is the same as the last year's. There was discussion about the proposed items. The banner locations are being lost due to Edison removing many of the poles. At first, it cost \$600 to have the banner made, and presently costs \$550 a year, and it keeps getting moved due to Edison removing lines. Last year, the Talmadge street was closed so there was minimal impact. We own the banner, however, we will not put up the banner again with the existing company. Other options will be investigated. Also, use of security is being re-considered, as the Stranahan has a sophisticated internal alarm system, and night deputies may not be needed. Gayle plans to propose a lesser contribution, and eliminate the nighttime hours, but not the daytime security. There will be a plan developed to present to the dealers. Also the number of guards may be excessive, and many were not circulating as expected. Mr.

Whiting, General Mgr of the Stranahan is working with Gayle to provide security information to the Dealers. Publicity was discussed. Loose flyers, as inserts to the Heralds, was discussed. Use of bright orange or yellow flyer color would be eye catching. We distribute the flyers to the Herald. We can pick the area of town with the Heralds. The stickers or loose flyers in the Blade are organized by an ad agency and are very expensive. We could stop the ads in the Ann Arbor and possibly the City or Mature Living Magazines. Use of the Weather channel crawl was discussed. The decisions will be made by the show committee. The Show budget was approved unanimously. Gayle reminded the Board to look for a new chairman for next year.

Phil Page, Gardens Facilities Director, was elected VP of Potter's Guild and as such, is their rep to ROC. He has volunteered to assume president role of ROC. Sharon Larrow, existing President, has served over two years, and indicated in September 2005 that she would stay on until a new president was found (no one wanted the job). Sharon Larrow, current President of ROC, has expressed concern that it might be a conflict of interest for him to be President of ROC, due to his position with the TBG. Chet, as our representative, meets with them tomorrow, and will be voting whether to accept him as President. The board decided to recommend that Chet, as the TG&RC representative, vote in the affirmative, for Phil to be elected President.

In regard to the damage to the Craft Center, the city of Toledo has contacted Pete after many calls to them. They are saying that the TBG, and the craft center, is now the responsibility of the Metroparks. TBG has stated that the city is still responsible for the damage. Ms. Schoeder, TBG Director, said she would contact the city. Mr. Boer of the Parks Commission is to work with the city on making the repairs.

There was a large donation of materials from a local family, including tools, rough rock, slabs, small findings, books. The useable tools and equipment has been divided up to the respective groups, for immediate members use. The Faceteers have taken what they are interested in. Beaders have not expressed an interest in the donation. The Gemcrafters and Metal Crafters have expressed interest in presenting the donated materials at their respective auctions to earn money for purchasing equipment. The board, after much discussion, decided to divide up the lot, sell some of the metal and slabs, at the metal crafter auction, and some of the same materials at gemcrafter auction. Whatever is left over, or does not sell, will go into the general club auction with proceeds for club use. The library may, in a future decision of the board, get a donation, depending on the proceeds from the club auction. The library has money in their account, and does not have an expressed need for additional earnings. Pete was willing to maintain two income tallies, so that the proceeds from the donated materials could be maintained separately during the Metal (Feb) and Gem (Apr) auctions. The proceeds from each of these two auctions (associated with these donated materials) will be divided equally between the groups.

The board adjourned at 8:20 p.m.

Presentation of the scholarship money was made to University of Toledo and Bowling

Green recipients. Three Bowling Green students who received the scholarships were present. Book donations were given by Bowling Green State University to the club library.

President Jim Leslie called the meeting to order at 8:10 P.M. with the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

**Secretary's reports** from last month's meeting and the **Board Meeting** will be posted in the Rocky Reader

**Treasurer's report** from 2005 was presented. We ended the year in the black. The proposed club budget for 2006 was presented and discussed. The proposed budget was approved. Gayle O'Riordon will be auditing the books. There was a discussion about saving money by changing our phone service to pay by the minute of time used. We would still have a phone on site and message service. Many months we have minimal use of the phone other than message receipts. We could get a lower rate with paying by the minute used. This change was approved.

**Craft Center:** There are continuing discussions with the city regarding the repairs, as the city is reluctant to pay, due to the change of ownership of the park to the Metroparks. Dick Borer Acting Director of the Parks will be dealing with the city on this.

The board decided to allow the Metalcrafters and Gemcrafters to sell the donated materials at their respective **auctions** in February and April. The money will be tracked and split between the two groups. What is left will be sold at the club auction in November.

**Gemcrafters:** Need to pay \$15 to **ROC** for TG&RC donation for printing a booklet on resident organizations. This was approved. Gemcrafters recently spent \$500-600 for new wheels for the Genie. Thanks to Ed Reynolds for the discounted price. Need to finish cutting dirty materials so the saw can be cleaned. Extra 50 cents studio fees to \$1 will

be charged for **Gemcraft** and **Metalcraft**, to help with the phone charges so that a phone can continue to be maintained for emergency purposes.

**Membership:** 2 juniors, 25 members and one new member.

**Metalcrafters:** Meetings as posted in the RR. **Auction in February** will have quite a bit of metal, some nice turquoise, various cabs and findings from the donated materials, in addition to the usual jewelry and craft related items. The metal base price will be consistent with mid-2005 silver costs, which is less than metal is currently going for, so bargains can be had. Members should come with donations and money to spend.

**Untried tips from untrustworthy (just KIDDING!) sources**

- Cutting narrow strips of cloth-backed silicon carbide paper and clamping them into your jeweler’s saw makes a handy sander for those hard-to-reach places in carvings and silver work (*The Rockpile*, 4/05)
- If you are on a field trip to collect jasper a good tip to separate the cutting material from the leaverite is to wet it. If it absorbs the water and dries rapidly, it will not polish. If it stays wet, it probably contains a lot of quartz and will take a good polish. (Chip and Lick, 12/03)
- Plume agates makes nice doublets with black jasper. (*The Quarry* 11/02)
- Never use ammonia, on genuine turquoise; it will turn it white. (The Quarry 11/02)
- Discs cut from Men’s Felt hats (think garage sales) make great buffs for your flex-shaft. (*Flint Flashers*, 2/04)
- To avoid flat spots on the cab you are polishing on the diamond wheels use light pressure and KEEP the cab MOVING over the WHOLE WHEEL. Any time you stop moving the cab, you create a “flat.” (*The Pegmatite* 1/05)

Charles Lewton-Brian has lots of untried tips for tool scrounging. Here are several as reprinted in *The Pegmatite* 10/04:

- The flint wheel of an older style disposable lighter makes a great carbide steel burr. Just pry it out and place it on a screw mandrel for your flexi shaft.
- Aquaplast, friendly plastic and the sheet material used to make casts are all great to make handles, soft jaws for pliers, etc. Simply place in hot water then form into the needed shape. It will harden again at room temperature.
- Ask your bike shop buddy for bent titanium bike spokes. They make great soldering pics.
- Want chasing tools?? Look for boxes of watchmaker’s staking tools. They are easily modified to suit one’s purposes and are much cheaper because they are “obsolete.”

Another source for great jewelry-making tips is the Orchid archives ([www.ganoksin.com/orchid/archive](http://www.ganoksin.com/orchid/archive))

- Computer mouspads make great surfaces for sanding small and delicate objects.
- Store your solders in daily pill organizers — be sure to label!
- Q-tips, bamboo skewers, toothpicks, etc can be chucked into your flexi-shaft machine and used to polish hard-to-reach places.
- If you cannot use a center punch to start your drill hole, you can make an indentation with a ball burr or graver.
- An old fingernail polish bottle is great to hold liquid flux. It even has a brush!
- Use water based white out (the solvent based type is toxic when heated) or denatured alcohol mixed with red rouge to keep solder from flowing into unwanted areas.
