February is the Silent Auction!

This auction will benefit the Metalcrafters and the new Faceteers II groups. If you have never done this before - here is the protocol:

Donations. Fill out a silent auction slip for each donation. If you want your donation to benefit the METALCRAFTER GROUP FILL OUT A WHITE DONATION SLIP. If you want your donation to benefit the FACETEERS II GROUP - FILL OUT A COLORED PAPER DONATION SLIP. List your name as the donor, and set a minimum price and minimum bid raise (Recommended: 50¢ for \$10 min bid; or less; \$1 for greater than \$10 min bid). If the item does not sell, we will return it to you.

Purchases. Look at everything and write your name and your bid on the bid sheet. If you really, really want something, go back frequently to up your bid OR bid extravagantly. We will announce the end of bidding (7:30). If you have the highest bid, at the end, collect your items and add up your totals for the white (Metalcrafter) and colored (Faceteers) II slips. Take your items and tallies to Steve and pay.

The silent auction finances Metalcrafter and Faceteers II tool purchases. We accept donations of metals, tools, jewelry, gemstones, beads, and other jewelry components for this auction.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Our year is beginning with a rousing start. We had quite an active discussion during the January meeting about scheduling in the Craft Center, start-up of a new Gemcrafter's Group, Moderator responsibilities, and New Member application process. I'm going to try to touch on these issues to keep everyone up to date.

First: Scheduling in the Craft Center. First of all, let me state that I think it is wonderful that our groups are so busy that we have to be concerned about this! That being said, the decision was made that Deb Hoffmaster, working with Elie Ghanime will be the gatekeepers of the monthly schedule. If you are a moderator of a group, you should consult with Deb to be assured that your group is listed correctly for this year's schedule. The repeating monthly group meetings will be listed first, with classes and intermittent meetings listed second. Please check out the schedule on the www.rockyreader.com website to be sure your group is in there!

Second: Daytime Gemcrafters Group. In February, we will be starting a new Daytime Gemcrafters Group which will meet on Thursdays from Noon until 4PM. We hope to relieve some of the pressure from the Wednesday evening sessions which are currently overloaded. I will be the moderator with Mike Burcewicz as the alternate. We will try this schedule for a month or two to see what kind of response we get.

Third: Moderator responsibilities. The moderator exists to supervise the session. He/she is trained with the safe and proper use of the pertinent equipment. As such, it is up to them to train new members and observe, supervise and advise current members as to their use. As a participant in a group session, it is expected that everyone will cheerfully follow the moderator's direction. In regards to the lapidary and metalcraft equipment, Elie, Deb and myself are drafting a Craft Center Protocol and Guideline which will be the basis of equipment training and safety rules. It will include an acknowledgement at the end which each member and the appropriate trainer/moderator will sign. The completed form will then be given to the Membership Chair to be included on a monthly list of authorized users of the equipment in the Craft Center. As such it will be necessary for even experienced, current members to review the training and sign the form. It is our hope that this process will refresh the training with current as well as standardize training for new members.

Fourth: New Member Application Process. Gene and Tonia Wallace are our Membership Secretaries. All membership applications must be given to them. They will then add the members to the list and submit the fee to the Treasurer. Until these two steps are complete, a new member cannot participate in a group or use club equipment. This is simply a liability issue. Until someone is officially a member, they are not covered on our insurance for such use. The membership list will be posted monthly in the Craft Center. Inclusion on this list is required before a new member can participate in a group or receive training on the equipment.

In closing I would like to commend everyone for participating in these processes which will ultimately benefit and protect the integrity of this great organization.

TG&RC MEETING MINUTES – January 20, 2010

President Jerri Heer called the meeting to order at 7:06 pm and members recited the Pledge of Allegiance. Professor Jim Harrel of The University of Toledo presented a program on the geo-archaeology of Jurash, Saudi Arabia.

Following the program, Mike Mayers presented the scholarship fund checks to Professor Harrel, and Professor Sheila Roberts of Bowling Green State University. This year's scholarship donations totaled \$505.50 to each school.

After a short break for refreshments, President Heer called the business meeting back to order.



Secretary's Report: Tom Marok moved to accept the minutes as written. John Hull seconded and the motion was approved.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Steve Shimatzki said there were some higher than normal expenses for the end of the year due to the prepay of TBG rental fees for the year, the scholarship donations and the deposit for the show. However the club remains in good financial shape. John Capuano asked about specific details and how the volunteer hours affected the yearly fee for TBG. Tom Marok moved to approve the Treasurer's report as read. John Kalinoski seconded, and the motion was approved.

Old Business: Diana Holt was installed as Vice-President. After the installation, Diana asked members for suggestions for programs.

New Business: Jerri Heer announced that scheduling use of the craft center has gotten more complicated as we have more groups wanting time and space. Accordingly, the Board considered this and agreed that all scheduling of classes, meetings, and use of the craft center should be done through two gatekeepers: Elie Ghamine and Deb Hoffmaster. If there are any unresolved conflicts, the President will make the final decision. Moderators who have groups with specific meeting times need to make sure they contact Deb or Elie to get their groups on the calendar.

Jerri brought up the issue of school and group presentations. Currently Chet King, Ed Reynolds and Jerri do most of the presentations but the club could use more people. Steve Shimatzki said he would try and get a short piece finished for the next Rocky Reader on the types of training people need for the school presentations.

Jerri said a daytime gemcrafters group is being established due to the heavy attendance on Wednesday nights. After discussion the proposal is to try for Thursday afternoons from 12-4 pm.

The Board will meet February 15th to finalize the annual budget.

The club needs a volunteer to do the annual audit of the Treasurer's books.

TBG: Chet King said the next event is the plant sale in May which earns the club a lot of volunteer hours. First Sunday kids' programs will start in May. In addition, the craft center is open the first Sunday of each month for cutting and those volunteer hours count.

Chet also announced that per Lucille Burgy he had the sad news of Peggy Jones' passing.

Gemcrafters: Elie reported that there is some additional equipment and that from now on there will be a new policy regarding equipment use. No one will be allowed to use the equipment who hasn't been trained on it. The requirement will be to do one cab from start to finish under supervision. This is to keep liability down and to keep equipment from being damaged or broken by improper use. The club will maintain a list of people who are qualified to use equipment and this can be updated each month. Elie said there would be a notice put in the Rocky Reader about training.

Metalcrafters: Deb Hoffmaster said the report would be published in the Rocky Reader.

CLASSES

The following schedule is a listing of upcoming classes. To enroll, please send all fees to the instructor. Fees must be received, at the latest, three weeks prior to the class, however, many classes fill up well in advance of this deadline.

February 13. 10AM. Solder Inlay. Instructor Debra Hoffmaster. Fee \$30.00. Three spaces left. This class will introduce the technique of solder inlay to add color to your designs. To be eligible for this class, students must have completed their introductory pendant.

March 13. 10AM. Copper trinket box. Instructor Debra Hoffmaster. Fee \$40. Five spaces left. Students in this class will construct an oval copper trinket box with a cabochon top. To be eligible for this class, students must have completed their introductory pendant.

April 10. 10AM. Enameling on copper. Instructor Harriet Nearing. Fee \$30. FULL. Students in this class will learn the basics of enameling by producing a small enameled copper shape that may be set into jewelry. Students will be provided with copper and enamels.

On February 7, I will be demonstrating the heat patination of copper to produce brilliant reds, pinks and oranges. This technique is good for producing nice red valentine hearts. So come with your sweetheart in mind and bring some copper shapes to patinate.

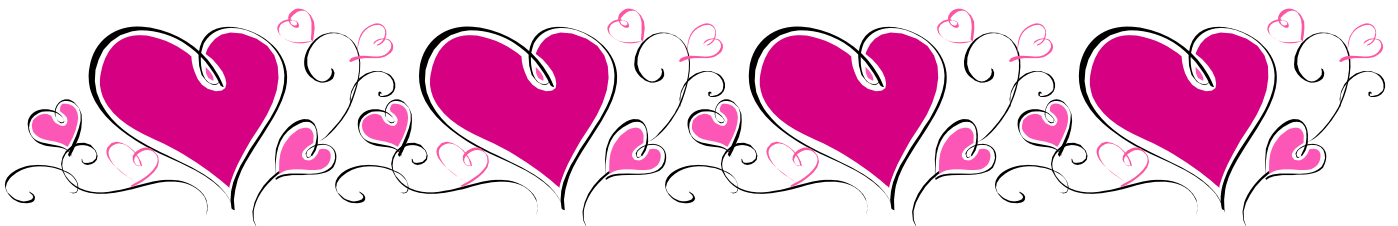

TEACHING LOCAL STUDENTS ABOUT ROCKS

Back in November I had the opportunity to help Ed Reynolds of R&E Rocks give a talk to a local grade school about rocks. It turned out to be a fun and rewarding experience with the kids, and I learned that cafeteria food isn't too bad after all... (In 9 years of previously working for a school system, I've NEVER eaten the cafeteria food, who would have guessed...).

I haven't talked to a room full of grade school children since I had to give my 7th grade book report on Tom Sawyer, many years ago. This left me a bit nervous as to what to expect, what I'd have to do to help Ed, time involved, etc. Ed assured me he'd cover the majority of the talking and that everything would be fine.

I met Ed at the parking lot of the Timberstone Jr High in Sylvania. Butterflies in my stomach and the sudden thought of just saying "I couldn't make it" passed quickly as Ed waved me over to his truck. Inside were some boxes in which Ed had a variety of specimens for the kids to touch-and-feel. After a few minutes of general talk we loaded his boxes onto his dolly and headed into the building.

In typical school fashion, we checked in at the main office and a volunteer led us to the classroom of Rina Ng where we setup some tables and sorted out the rocks and minerals that Ed had brought for the talk. Rina's class joined us along with Carol Bohland's class and we proceeded to have a wonderful talk about rocks.

We had arranged the rocks in groupings of what Ed planned to cover and saved the Meteorite and Dinosaur Coprolite for last. As you might imagine, the minds of the typical Jr. High student led to broad questions about what Ed had brought with him. So Ed would start off by talking about the rocks, moving down the line and finishing with the best. The last 15 minutes were reserved for open questions and touch-and-feel of the rocks. This format saved us the chaos of constant interruption, but we took good questions when they came up.

Overall the children seemed to enjoy Ed's talk and I had a fun time helping and learning what to expect next time I might help again. As for what I contributed? Eventually Ed was parched and his tongue started to get the best of him. It was at this point that I gave him a break. Having seen Ed give the talk, I found it surprisingly easy to jump in and pick up where he left off. I was amazed at myself for not freezing up or forgetting the finer points of how a fossil is made. Would I do it again? Anytime Ed... Anytime...

CONSERVATION & LEGISLATION NEWS

California Desert Conservation and Recreation Act of 2010

Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) introduces legislation that would withdraw 1.6 million acres of desert landscapes from public access. The 1.6 million acres is larger than the state of Connecticut and this legislation will close some of the best rockhound collecting areas in Southern California. The proposed legislation, known as the California Desert Conservation and Recreation Act, will designate from the Avawatz Mountains near Death Valley to the largest Sonoran woodland in North America along the Colorado River....

Section 14: Prohibited Uses of Donated and Acquired Lands.

This section would prohibit the use of donated or acquired lands for development, mining, offhighway vehicle use (except designated routes), grazing, military training and other surface disturbing activities. (This means Rockhounding) This prohibition would apply to public lands within the California Desert Conservation Area.

It will not do any good to write to our California senators but, we might find a sympathetic ear in some of the other 49 states or in the House of Representatives. If we value our rockhound hobby in Southern California we must act soon or the only way we will be able to enjoy our public lands and deserts is by buying pictures of the Desert from those supporting this bill. Write your elected officials and voice your opinion and concerns.

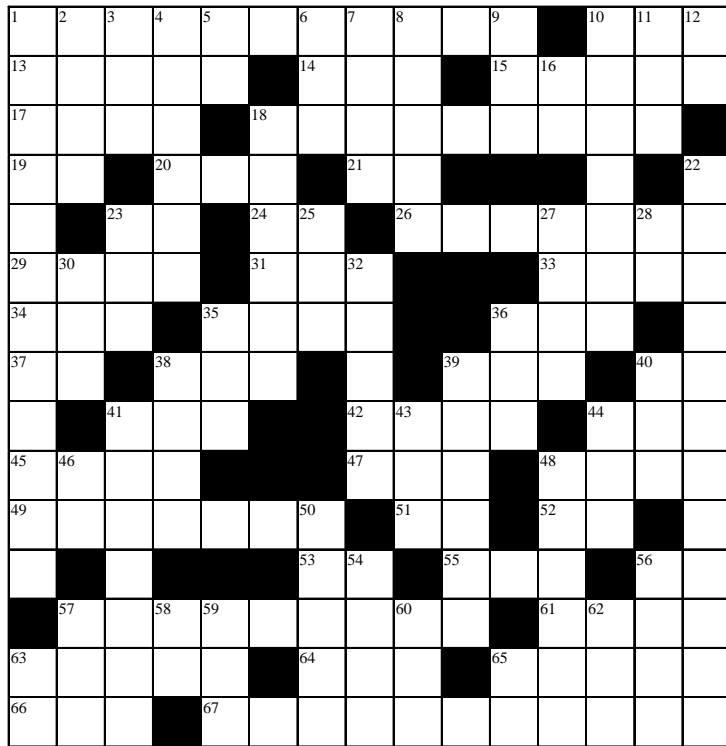
