CLASSES

The following schedule is a listing of upcoming classes. To enroll, please send all fees to the instructor. Fees must be received, at the latest, three weeks prior to the class, however, many classes fill up well in advance of this deadline.

Faceting. Chet King and Elie Ghanime are organizing a training course on faceting. The course will be divided into two segments; Introduction to Faceting, then Learn How to Facet. If you are interested, please email Elie at eghanime@buckeye-express.com. Space is limited and will be on first come first serve basis.

November 14. 10AM. Chainmaille. Instructor Kathy Petersen. Fee \$85. Only one place left in this class. This is the Full Persian bracelet designed by Kathy and published in the February 2009 issue of Bead and Button Magazine. The fee includes all materials: a designer bead set from Hager Studios, a designer clasp, and sterling silver jump rings. Call Kathy to register for the class. As you know, these classes fill up quickly, so be sure to register early.

November 15. 10AM. Coloring on Copper workshop. There is NO Charge for this repeat of the class offered last year, BUT you must supply your own copper. If you want to participate, you MUST give the copper you want patinated to Debby Hoffmaster at the OCTOBER club meeting. I will supply colored pencils, spray and turpentine.

January 23 & 24. 10AM. Chasing Tools and Patterning Mokume. Instructors Hans Ruebel and Debra Hoffmaster. Fee \$40. Four spaces left. This class will consist of two sessions: the first will be devoted to the construction of steel chasing tools. It will be taught by Hans Ruebel of the Toledo Museum of Art. The second session will be devoted to the patterning of a Copper/brass mokume-gane billet. It will be taught by Debra Hoffmaster. Students will be provided with tool steel and the mokume billet.

February 13. 10AM. Solder Inlay. Instructor Debra Hoffmaster. Fee \$30.00. Four spaces left. This class will introduce the technique of solder inlay to add color to your designs. To be eligible for this class, students must have completed their introductory pendant.

March 13. 10AM. Copper trinket box. Instructor Debra Hoffmaster. Fee \$40. Five spaces left. Students in this class will construct an oval copper trinket box with a cabochon top. To be eligible for this class, students must have completed their introductory pendant.

April 10. 10AM. Enameling on copper. Instructor Harriet Nearing. Fee \$30. Two spaces left. Students in this class will learn the basics of enameling by producing a small enameled copper shape that may be set into jewelry. Students will be provided with copper and enamels.

Keeping Ivory in Light

Don't put ivory in the dark. It is one substance that needs light. If it has started to yellow, take half a lemon, rub it in some salt. Then rub it over the ivory object. The lemon will work on the yellow discoloration. After it is dry, dampen a soft cloth with lukewarm water and rub the ivory piece to give it a bright finish.

Cleaning Druzy Specimens

To clean and shine most druzy specimens, use Easy-Off Oven cleaner (fume free is OK). Spray the specimen and leave it overnight in a closed container or bag before rinsing. This works on iron stained quartz crystals.

Toothpaste?

Toothpaste with fluoride formula has the unique characteristic of penetrating stone, ceramics, brick or terra cotta and slushing dirt to the surface, where it can be flushed away with water. It was used to restore Etruscan vases by New York's most famous art and antique restorer.

Sawing (or What's Inside?)

There is a common belief that you never know what will be inside a rock until you saw it open. There may be some surprises, but the lapidary has a lot more control over what sawing will produce than is commonly believed. The biggest mistake is fitting the rock into the vise. ("This rock fits perfectly into the vise, therefore, that must be the direction in which I should cut it.") I have seen hundreds of slabs of aventurine that have no sparkle because they were cut in the direction in which they most conveniently fit into the vise. The same holds true for tiger eye and for most feldspars, such as labradorite or spectrolite.

The solution to getting the proper cut is no farther away than the scrap wood pile and some white glue such as Elmer's™ Glue. If you have a piece of aventurine and you want maximum sparkles, glue the piece to the lumber scrap with the sparkly side up. Give the glue about a week to dry and set up hard, then set the stone in the vise with the sparkles parallel to the blade. You should end up with some very nice slabs.

Tiger eye and feldspar are nice blocky minerals that fit very nicely into the saw vise, all in the wrong way. With tiger eye, make the cut such that it is parallel to the direction of the broken, fibrous surface. Glue one of the fibrous surfaces to a board and get ready to cut some very fine eye material. The tiger eye will be at an angle to the saw blade, and not in a block that is essentially perpendicular to it.

For feldspars, to orient the stone, take the block you wish to cut and roll it about under a bright incandescent lamp. (Do not use fluorescent lights or the ecologically safe lights as these do not have the proper wave lengths of light to be of any help.) You will find that when the surface of the stone shows the maximum reflection and color, that surface will be about 10 degrees off of the horizontal. Making your cut parallel to that surface will produce the best effect. You will need to have a few shims to set the block at about 10 degrees to the board. Make sure to not cut wood with your diamond saw; use small rock scraps for shims, or cut some from a soft rock such as alabaster or limestone.

When slicing agate nodules, cuts parallel to the surface will produce an opened pattern, whereas cuts that are perpendicular to the surface produce a tightly banded fortification pattern. By different orientation of the stone, you can produce opened or closed patterns at will. Too many lapidaries tend to throw away the end cuts of agate nodules, but these often produce some of the most outstanding patterns when the surface is sawed away. My late friend, Bill White, won many American Federation trophies for his cabochons that came off of the end cuts; material that most people would have thrown away.

When working with big cabochons, it is often quicker and less expensive to remove the excess material with the trim saw. This was especially true when carbide wheels were in vogue, and diamond grinders were not in use.

At any rate, you are the one in charge when sawing a rock. The rock doesn't have any say in the matter. Don't be hasty; use some glue and board scraps. Treat the material with the care and kindness it deserves.
